

Dear Friends of IOLTA,

All North Carolinians deserve to have their basic needs met and their civil rights protected. Justice is foundational to the safety, health, and wellbeing of the entire community. As a partner in the civil justice community, we strive to heighten awareness about the need for civil legal aid. As a grantmaker, we support the work of legal aid providers who serve clients in need regardless of their ability to pay.

Grantees of NC IOLTA closed 27,687 cases on behalf of clients in 2020. Family law matters, including services to prevent domestic violence, and housing law, including preventing eviction and foreclosure, remained the highest areas of need.



Highlights of 2020 include:

- IOLTA grantees responded to critical needs in times of crisis. Legal services organizations are a vital player in disaster response and recovery. The pandemic presented new challenges for all, but IOLTA grantee organizations quickly responded to client needs as in past disasters. From ensuring access to medical care to assisting small businesses and nonprofits with securing available funding to protecting the rights of incarcerated individuals, IOLTA grantees worked collaboratively to assess the evolving circumstances presented by the pandemic and identify solutions to address the needs of the community.
- 2020 Strategic Support grants promoted transition to remote work.
 Approved in 2019, Strategic Support grants totaling \$1.25 million were distributed in 2020. Eight grants included support for technology upgrades, necessary improvements in a regular year but truly critical in the midst of a pandemic which required remote work. Supported technology investments included laptops, phone systems, and enhancements to case and donor management software.
- 2020 Legal Needs Assessment. In 2020, IOLTA supported the development
 of a Legal Needs Assessment, the first comprehensive assessment of civil legal
 needs in North Carolina in more than two decades. Released in April 2021,
 the study was conducted in partnership with UNC Greensboro's Center for
 Housing and Community Studies, the NC Equal Access to Justice Commission,
 and Equal Justice Alliance. IOLTA was honored to support this effort.

Thank you for all you do to help ensure North Carolinians have access to civil legal aid that allows them to meet their basic needs.

• \$64,000 to assist public interest attorneys across the state with loan repayment obligations

North Carolina Justice Center

- \$468,750 to support statewide impact litigation efforts and legal services to immigrants
- \$79,800 to provide foreclosure prevention legal assistance
- \$384,500 to support community redevelopment legal assistance
- \$95,980 to support racial equity work, technology purchases, and leadership development

North Carolina Prisoner Legal Services

- \$50,000 to protect the rights of jail inmates to safe and humane conditions
- \$20,200 to support equity, diversity and inclusion training, staff development, technology purchases, and website development

Pisgah Legal Services

- \$52,500 to support civil legal aid in Western NC
- \$62,500 to support pro bono legal services in Western NC
- \$56,000 to provide foreclosure prevention legal assistance
- \$300,000 to support community redevelopment legal assistance
- \$103,745 to support equity, diversity, and inclusion work and training, as well as IT and infrastructure upgrades




